Alanis Obomsawin, Abenaki, of Odanak in Southern Quebec is a seasoned & multi award-winning documentary filmmaker who has raised native Canadian issues to a position of national & international account for more than 30 years.

Novelist, director & producer Tsitsi Dangarembga studied medicine at Cambridge in the UK, & later psychology in Africa. One of Zimbabwe's most acclaimed filmmakers, her feature film *Neria* was the highest grossing film in Zimbabwe when it was released in 1993.

ALANIS OBOMSAWIN

Here, within the practice of the filmmaker's own cultural traditions & the objectives of her profession, she is focused upon her Abenaki homelands of Quebec, New England, & the Maritimes in the United States, where Abenaki life spans at least 12,000 years. Carefully selected rare photographs of Abenaki ancestors animated by historic accounts of family & friends intertwine with contemporary images, sounds, & languages to engender an indelible sense of people & land. In this mode, eloquent testimonies drawn from elders, fishermen, a canoe builder, artists, rights activists, in particular, mothers & grandmothers who are basket-makers of exquisite skill, describe successive draconian laws & government policies that deny sovereign rights, hampering progress & environmental protection. It is a familiar situation in Aboriginal communities across the world. Particularly significant is the Abenaki peoples' pervasive knowledge of & clarity about their culture, economy, & governance, & their history, their present, & the shape & needs of the future. The intrinsic relevance of Aboriginal rights to the wellbeing of global & colonial society is emphasised in *Waban-Aki*, which documents a responsive & dignified discourse.

San Francisco Botes is a Mayan community that lives by the Hondo River, a border between Mexico, Belize & Guatemala. They are known as "Pacific		
Mayans" who were dislocated from their land during the "Mayan War". This conflict was also known as "The Castes' War". The territorial dislocation		
experienced by the Pacific Mayans was due to their resistance to venerate the Sacred Christian Cross, hence their given name "Pacificos". After they settle		
San Francisco Botes, other migrants from diverse areas of Mexico -named "Colonos" [colonisers] arrived into that region. The Colonos attempted to impose		
their lifestyle but not without resistance from the Pacific Mayans. Mutual confrontation & hostility dominated their relationship. Currently, the Pacific Mayans' history & knowledge is only passed on to new generations by the elders of their community. These stories are told with great respect & dignity, &		
through them, the Pacific Mayans express their desires to continue being.

B.L.A.C.K. is not just about a skin colour - it is a celebration & understanding of the Aboriginal voice in hip-hop. This is a film with rhythm, rhyme & reason.
